Techniques. Like other mosaics, Byzantine mosaics are made of small pieces of glass, stone, ceramic, or other material called tesserae. During the Byzantine period, craftsmen expanded the materials that could be turned into tesserae, beginning to include gold leaf and precious stones, and perfected their construction.

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According to 1st century architect Vitruvius, the ideal foundation of a mosaic was made of four layers. The first layer, called statumen , was composed of large chunks of bricks or pottery.
